For the generous support and untiring effort in his service to his fellowmen and community in his service to the Girl Scouts of the Philippines which earned him the Gold Service Award (1982) and the Pearl Service Award (1991), his service to the Boy Scouts





MY PHILOSOPHY IN ARCHITECTURE MANUEL T. MAÑOSA, JR., FUAP LIKHA AWARDEE 1996

Recalling what made my architecture for two scores and six years is like progressing through a time tunnel where technology and its products to whirl so fast in the continuity of space and time. As I zoom from the past into the present, the velocity of my architecture increases before me. When I began my career in architecture the slide rule, the quill pen and the ruling pen were my tools. I did not have the slightest idea that I shall be designing buildings, towns and cities with the use of computers and the electronics media. Only a few months ago I was communicating with staff members on study leave through the internet. I am indeed fortunate that my practice allows me to use the information highway in hastening the delivery of architecture in the speed of light. And its utility in architecture and urban planning is just beginning. In this manner, I feel fulfilled for I work with up-to-date, state of the art tools in furthering my practice. Despite the sophistication in the practice of architecture, the temptation to take short cuts is great. The country atmosphere is not conductive to hold steadfast on morale and ethics. It is here where a strong philosophical base becomes the beacon, even as my guidepost in creating space and places that are true to the spirit of the peoples' culture.

I have never worked alone. I have the strong belief that in the type of work I do in architecture, which in the broadening field of urban design and city planning, collaborative, multi disciplinary teamwork is the key to innovate and creative endeavors. I began my practice with my brothers forming the partnership.

It is with a long-viewed philosophical base where working with the professionals I associate with attains maturity and constancy. It is in this process where history is made; when innovations in practice are developed; and where reputations have to be kept. It is in this light where good architecture, urban design and city planning is recognized. In formulating the philosophy of the company I now head, the Planning Resources & Operations Systems (PROS), my colleagues and I held to the value of having like minds. This is the same principled practice that can be expressed as the need for planning organizations that must cope in an integral manner with present day development projects. PROS in its formative stage has anticipated the diversity of the brain power demanded by the ever increasing magnitude of major projects that are beyond the capabilities of individual specialists or group with singular specializations. Nevertheless, we at

PROS recognized the effectivity of teams with diverse resources assembled on a project-to-project basis. These teams, we had to delicately organize to be sure how compatible the combination shall be.

Corporate practice must keep up with the management styles of the times in order to survive. But it is the organization's ethics, principles, and philosophy that fuel the sense of its perpetuity. I look to the day when the company' leadership is handed over to those in the second echelon of today's management, and on, and on... This vision gives vibrancy to a planning consulting service firm like PROS.

As an organization man I held on to the view that an architect, as a practicing professional must belong to an association. I have a very strong opinion for unity in diversity. I was with colleagues in the Philippine Institute of Architects who had the desire and the opportunity to spearhead the union of all Filipino architects to what is now the United Architects of the Philippines. This is a fulfillment my colleagues and I cherish. Now it is up to the younger generation in UAP to keep the union intact.

As I progressed in the path I took for my career, I understood well the value of adhering to one's principles and philosophies. I value the tenets of culture and society. I value close-knit relations with family as well as with colleagues. I value, most of all communing with my Creator.

Regular trips to the uplands and the countryside when validating sites for new development are experiences that places the smallness of me before the wonders of nature, the glistening of cascading waters, or the howling of the winds. All these bring in me a surging respect for environment, geography and geology. These help boost my confidence that the right way to build is to design with nature.

A people-to-people stance in furthering planning and design activities works well if mutual respect for one's calling is engendered. I have experienced this well in my work with my colleagues in Gabon, West Africa, in China for a collaborative work on a hotel, or even in Paraguay and Kalimantan. This approach has also worked well in the Philippine countryside or in dialogues with the urban poor. Yes! Designing for the built environment is team work, wholistic and multi-disciplinary.


In homebuilding, I endeavor to project the owner's character. This is working

and designing with people in its very basic form. It is in homebuilding where architecture must be relevant to the multi-functional ways of the family. It is also in this building type where the value of a well-structured architecture education becomes useful in thinking comprehensively with the client.

I take pride in saying that my father was responsible in introducing me to urban planning and city design. I remember well his collection of books on the subject of garden cities. I have voraciously read through the volumes to even excite me to work on this topic for my undergraduate thesis. Completion of my undergraduate studies prodded me to go on further to learn and experience the meaning of urban planning. I searched the west for new mentors, new insights and new meanings on what city design can mean to the urban conditions in the Philippines. These experiences helped well in forming my philosophies in life.


It is now my tact to say the architecture is not building interiors alone. It is more! It has to look at relations of buildings with each other; buildings have spaces inbetween. These have to be treated well in order to evoke character. Groups of buildings have common needs and safety requirements. Through my architecture, I have to give everyone the opportunity to find their happiness. And it is through my architecture that I become closer to friends, family and God.


PROPOSED




SOUTH MANILA BAY RECLAMATION PROJECT
